# EDUCATION FOR ALL: SERVING CALIFORNIA'S VULNERABLE CHILDREN

In our 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, EdSource invites you to join us for an education conference you won't want to miss—the EdSource Symposium.

Entitled, Education For All: Serving California's Vulnerable Children, the Symposium will look at what schools and communities can do to ensure that all students are adequately served, especially in light of federal policies that may conflict with those in place in California, and the state's own reform agenda.

In this timely response to current concerns, fear and anxieties, we will focus on what schools can do to best serve immigrant children, or those with immigrant parents. But we will also look at other vulnerable populations that may be affected by changes in federal policies, including special education students, LGBTQ students, and low-income children—and how California can play a leadership role in ensuring that students graduate from high school prepared to succeed in college and the workplace.
